

#### INTRODUCTION

Corangamite's Council vision is for a connected and thriving community. Our young people aged 12-25 years make up 17.2% of our population and view 'connectivity' as essential to 'their community'.

Corangamite Shire Council recognises the important role young people play in our community and as our future. The aim of Corangamite's Youth Services is to ensure that every young person in Corangamite feels connected, is heard and valued, is supported to overcome challenges and has opportunities to reach their full potential. Sync provides the strategic framework, the plan, on how we will achieve this.

Sync was created in the first half of 2020, amidst the COVID-19 Pandemic lockdown following Australia's bushfire crisis and the recovery of our own area from the 2018 St Patrick's Day fires. Young people were adapting to a life of physical isolation where social interaction, education and employment moved online, and life changed in new and uncertain ways.

#### SYNCING WITH POLICY

#### Victorian State Government

The Victorian Government Youth Policy, Building Stronger Youth Engagement in Victoria, includes ways for diverse young people to have a voice, access the services they need, become job ready, develop leadership skills and celebrate youth culture, to highlight a few. There is an emphasis on embedding youth views and aspirations into government planning and service delivery as a whole of government approach. (State Government of Victoria, Department of Health and Human Services, Youth Policy, 2016)

Sync aligns with the State Government policy's direction, albeit on a smaller scale and is also underpinned by a whole of organisation approach working inclusively with young people in our planning, service delivery, vision and future. The State Government's Engagement Charter's guiding principles also guide the work of our Youth Services:

- Recognition and respect for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander People
- Cultural respect
- Equality
- Youth-centred
- Belonging, connectedness and identity (State Government of Victoria), and;

We'd like to go one step further and include equity as a principal to work towards.

#### United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child

The United Nations (UN) Convention on the Rights of the Child state that young people have the right to participate and contribute in decision making processes that affect them. Youth participation underpins Sync by valuing and placing the views and aspirations of our youth community as central to what we do. Council values young people and will take into account their views and opinions in decisions that impact their lives. (United Nations (1990) Convention on the Rights of the Child).

#### Corangamite Shire Council

Sync aims to support the delivery of the many objectives of Theme 5 of the 2017-2021 Council Plan; Safe and Healthy Communities in its inclusive and participant led strategies. It also recognises our specific youth achievements outlined in the plan as;

- Supporting youth partnership with secondary schools and other community partners
- Supporting Corangamite Youth, (SCY) network
- Working with schools and community groups to raise resilience of young people
- Increased Youth Council participation of non-school aged individuals

Going forward we aim to expand on these achievements by working in partnership with our youth community as we implement Sync.

The Corangamite Shire Municipal Public Health and Wellbeing Plan 2017 -2021 also identifies the increase of connection to culture and communities, increasing access to social support and increase mental wellbeing. (Corangamite Shire Council Plan, 2016)

#### Corangamite Shire as a Child Safe organisation

Corangamite Shire Council is committed to the safety, participation and empowerment of all children and young people. Reducing and removing the risk of child abuse is at the centre of our decision-making concerning children and young people in our organisation. Council as a Child Safe organisation has zero tolerance for child abuse and all allegations and safety concerns are treated seriously and acted upon. Council will actively listen to children and young people, ensuring their voices are heard and considered in decisions that affect their lives. (Corangamite Shire Council, Child Safe Policy, 2020)

#### THE CREATION OF SYNC

#### IT'S ALL ABOUT THE JOURNEY

A Youth Strategy is essentially a broad plan designed to guide all that we do. Sync is an important tool that will not only guide the work of Corangamite Youth Services but will also identify and value young people and the issues that are vital to making their place in this community the best it can be.

From the beginning, Sync aimed to draw a picture of the needs, aspirations and issues of importance that matter most to the young people of Corangamite and what better artisans than local young people? A process known as co-design was used in developing this strategy; where young people were not only represented but were part of the design process. Because at Corangamite Youth Services it really is all about YOUth!

Sync aligns with the State Government policy's direction, albeit on a smaller scale. It is also underpinned by a whole of organisation approach working inclusively with young people in our planning, service delivery, vision and future. The State Government's Engagement Charter's guiding principles also steer the work of our Youth Services

This is Corangamite Shire's first Youth Strategy, so we began by doing some work with Spark Strategy.

Together we conducted:


- Desktop research
- 15 stakeholder interviews, with Council staff, one Councillor, five young people and five community partners
- Ideation workshop to uncover opportunities for the future with the Council's leadership group
- 253 survey responses collected from young people
- Youth Council Workshop to co-design with young people
- Stress Testing Workshop to test and refine the strategy
- Guiding Document written and designed by Corangamite Shire

#### Action Plan - SyncUp

Sync has been prepared with the intent of creating an annual action plan to be co-designed with young people each year to ensure our services remain contemporary, relevant, authentic and most of all appealing to our youth community. Corangamite Youth Services values co-design as a process that takes both time and practice to master and we will support our young designers' development each year to help their skills in co-design grow.

















## WHAT IS CORANGAMITE FOR YOUNG PEOPLE?

With 12 communities dotted across 440.731 hectares, from the sandstone cliffs of the Great Ocean Road in the South, through stringybark forests, rolling hills of fertile pastures, volcanic grassland plains studded with extinct volcanoes to broadacre cropping in the North... Corangamite is geographically spectacular.

geography creates some challenges for young people. Limited public transport is one of those challenges with many young people reliant on parents, carers or public transport services to get about.




#### MORE THAN 50% LIVE IN A RURAL SETTING

Corangamite's young people often describe themselves as 'townies' or 'farm kids' and are equally proud to belong to their respective location. Farm kids don't always live on a farm, but they live out of town and identify with the freedom and the connection to land that this gives them.

Townies live in the townships, big or small and are more likely to have access to services and public transport.













## CENTRAL CAMPERDOWN TERANG COBDEN



1,701 young people aged between 10 to 24 years old live here, our largest population of young people who have the most access to public transport and multiple options for secondary schools. Camperdown, Terang and Cobden have a good range of shops and at least one medical centre available.

Whilst our largest town, Camperdown, is a well serviced rural town, its largest population is retirees.












#### SOUTH SIMPSON TIMBOON PORT CAMPBELL PRINCETOWN PETERBOROUGH



714 Young people call the south home, with more than 50% living rurally. The south is said to have the healthiest economy due to tourism, with young people connecting their locality's identity to the Great Ocean Road or ice-creamery! (WKYNBNYS, 2019) Young people in the south celebrate a connection to environment with recreational opportunities such as the rail trail and a beach lifestyle. The south is also part of the biggest dairying region in the southern hemisphere.

Young people identified that due to tourism, activities and places to eat and drink can be higher than other areas (Youth Conversations 2020). Conversely tourism provides multiple employment opportunities for young people year-round.

#### **NORTH SKIPTON LISMORE DERRINALLUM DARLINGTON**



353 aged between 10 to 24 - years live in the north, it's our smallest populous, has the least accessibility and highest percentage of rural residents. Young people in Skipton attend high school in Ballarat. Other students in the north attend high school at Derrinallum College or travel to Camperdown.

The North boasts volcanic plains, lakes and unique wildlife such as platypus and brolgas, however the environment is not as widely celebrated for its environmental recreational options as the South. The small townships of Lismore, Derrinallum and Skipton offer a small range of shops and services which translates to fewer employment opportunities for young people and very limited access to healthcare without a private car.

**Co-design** – is where the participants (or those who'll use the end product) are involved in the whole process. For youth co-design; young people should be involved in identifying the issue, developing the way to solve it and then participate in the solution.

Collaborator - a person who works together with another.

**Corangamite Trade Training Cluster** – CTTC a long name to describe the 5 schools of Corangamite that share facilities to enable secondary students to complete certificate training through the VET program.

Disparity - difference.

**Equity** – is the act or idea that everyone gets what they need rather than the same as everyone else regardless of what they already have.

**Equality** – equality is the idea or act where everyone gets the same portion regardless of what they already have

**Farm kid** – the term many Corangamite young people use to describe themselves when they live outside of the towns. They may or may not be on a farm.

**FReeZA** – is an innovative youth development program that enables young people to enjoy fully supervised drug, alcohol and smoke-free events. Each year up to 400 FReeZA events are staged, with over 150,000 young people attending from across Victoria.

**Services** – generally at Council it means what we provide for the community like; the immunisation service, rubbish removal, facility provisions and maintenance. Just to be confusing we also like to use the word to describe; medical centres, mental health practices, which are not provide by Council.

**Townie** - the term many Corangamite young people use to describe themselves when they live in a township.

Philosophy - an attitude or way of guiding our thinking.

**Policy** – an outline of a course of action generally written into a document by an organisation – governments have loads of them!

**Youth Centred** – to view issues from a young person's point of view. Youth services that are 'youth centred' aim to understand what is important to young people to maintain a life that is meaningful to them.

SCY - An acronym for the Corangamite network Supporting Corangamite Youth. This network invites all stakeholders who work in the area of youth in Corangamite Shire. Active members include school staff (teachers, principals, wellbeing support), health promotion officers, regional Youth Affairs Council of Victoria staff and other health services staff to name a few. Strategy - a plan of action to work towards a long-term aim or goal.
