Welcome to the autumn edition of Corangamite News

Corangamite's Australia Day celebrations in Derrinallum were a terrific opportunity to recognise the people who are making a difference in their communities.

The Derrinallum P12 College stadium was almost full, demonstrating the day's enormous popularity. Congratulations to our Citizen of the Year Carole Manifold, Young Citizen Piper Kenna and Community Event Colour Terang Festival.

In early March, Council held some community feedback sessions on the Positioning Simpson and Timboon for the Future project.

This important project looks at how both of these towns can capitalise on growing visitor numbers to the Twelve Apostles, Port Campbell and surrounding hinterland.

A new record was set at the Twelve Apostles on Christmas Day 2019, with 15,269 people arriving in 3000 cars, 170 buses and 11 coaches. More of these visitors are now venturing into the hinterland thanks to the food trail.

Residential land and housing, long term rentals and accommodation are already in short supply in both townships, and this is beginning to

impact communities in the south of the Shire.

There are some major projects on the horizon for both areas - including the extension of the rail trail to Port Campbell, Glenample Visitor Experience Centre, Twelve Apostles Hot Springs and Resort, and the potential development of the former Kraft factory site in Simpson. The project explores how Council can supply worker accommodation, more rural lifestyle properties, and free up larger housing for the family market - as well as opportunites and issues around roads, urban design, neighbourhood character, car parking, community facilities, and cultural heritage. Corangamite's top citizens

Camperdown's Carole Manifold is Corangamite Shire's 2020 Citizen of the Year.

She was presented with the award at the official celebrations in Derrinallum.

Two other major awards were announced as part of the celebrations:

- Young Citizen of the Year Piper Kenna-Terang
- Community Event of the Year Colour Terang Festival

Derrinallum P-12 College Principal Caitlyn Fitzgerald delivered the keynote speech.

Three new Australians received citizenship and a free barbeque lunch and entertainment followed the ceremony.

Citizen of the Year Mrs Manifold has beaten breast cancer twice, which gives her great empathy and understanding for her patients in her work as a breast care nurse.

"Once the doctor rings to say 'Carole, you've got another patient,' you just get straight in the car and go to see them: prior to surgery, post-surgery, and through the treatment."

Mrs Manifold has raised \$20,000 for Peter's Project cancer clinic in Warrnambool by making Christmas cakes, even while she was undergoing chemotherapy herself.

She said the Warrnambool clinic was a big improvement from her time commuting to Geelong and Melbourne for treatment. "It's so much better now. They can get surgery in Camperdown or Warrnambool and get treatment in Warrnambool."

Young Citizen of the Year Miss Kenna, 9, is being recognised for her outstanding work raising more than \$13,000 for cancer treatment and research.

She said the recognition made her feel pretty special. "The original idea was just to cut my hair but then I thought, 'If I'm going to cut my hair, I might as well shave it. It's just hair'."

The appeal, involving a page on the mycause website, raffles and a blind auction, raised \$13,242 for breast cancer and leukaemia, both of which had affected Piper's family.

The Colour Terang Festival added to the Shire's social and cultural calendar to fill the void left by the Terang Country Music Festival.

It included a colour dash, kite making, markets, live music, art displays, vintage cars, churches, nature play, photography, quilts, roving





performers, musicians, a choir and an art installation.

Terang Progress Association President Ben Dennis, one of the key organisers, said receiving the Community Event Award was "really humbling".

MAJOR PROJECTS

Transforming the land through raised bed cropping

Matt and Rachel Hinkley have been farming raised bed crops near Darlington for 17 years with a combined 1800 Ha of their own property and land leased from neighbours.

"It was a sheep property – fine wool Merino. It needed a lot of love and attention," Matt said.

"North of the Princes Highway there's been a fair transformation from beef and sheep into crops. Of that a fair proportion-certainly closer to Camperdown-is raised bed."

Developed by Southern Farming Systems at Inverleigh in the late 1990s, raised bed farming does what it says on the tin. Channels are dug between the beds to allow better runoff management, overcoming waterlogging in wet seasons and reducing runoff in dry periods. This means less erosion and nutrient loss.

After five years growing cotton under irrigation near Moree, the Mortlake lad and his Geelong bride—who both have agricultural science degrees—moved to Corangamite Shire with the aim of establishing a raised bed farm.

"We wanted to be in the high rainfall zone for the reliability," Matt said.

The Hinkleys grow canola, wheat and

barley, and are starting to grow faba beans as a break crop.

"We've had the whole place topographically mapped. That allows us to plan where we're going to put extra water and manage that. For us, that's primarily running it into wetlands."

Because raised bed farms can shed a lot of water, particularly in winter, farmers need to ensure their drains are built so there is no runoff from their property to affect roads, neighbours or surrounding land.

In a good year, Matt says, they can produce double the national average crop. Through shaping the beds, adding gypsum, and using minimum till to reduce wheel movements, the Hinkleys have improved the compacted soil structures on flat waterlogged areas. The beds provide an aerobic soil environment for crops and root action has deepened water holding capacity from 200-300mm below the surface to about 800mm.

"In years like 2015, we were still able to use all that stored water," Matt said. "It's not just a surface transformation With organic matter content, it's got a beautiful chocolate colour. There's as much biomass below the surface as above."



Raising in popularity

It's not new, but raised-bed farming is rapidly becoming more popular in the Shire with ripple effects for land values across the Shire.

Elders Camperdown Real Estate Manager Rob Rickard said the practice had enabled people in the higher rainfall grazing belt of Corangamite Shire to be consistent in their production.

"As you come south from the Glenelg Highway, on the northern boundary of Corangamite Shire, the soil type tends to become heavier and rainfall increases slightly which, in turn, makes raised bed cropping an attractive opportunity over conventional cropping or farming."

"Land values have risen as a result of two very good seasons, leading some farmers to expand around them. For those who haven't been able to find land nearby, they have, in some cases, opted to go south of the highway, into what was traditionally dairy country, to purchase higher rainfall land that can complement their livestock enterprises."

Mount Noorat Hotel

For the past five years Mount Noorat Hotel owner Richard Conheady has been on a mission to bring the pub back to life.

After interior renovations, the pub now employs eight staff and opens five days a week, offering accommodation, lunch and dinner, and Sunday breakfast, as well as a café.

"I'm wanting to get the pub to a point where it's self-sustaining and running with a team that allows me to focus on the next stage of the renovation which is outside," Richard said. "It was last restored in the 1970s. We removed a floating ceiling and bulkhead above the bar restored the pressed metal ceilings.

"We painted and reconfigured upstairs to start taking guest s for the first time since the 1940s.

"The focus is on group bookings and weekends where people stay for two nights. It's used a lot for birthdays and weddings when people are down in the area."

Richard said local community support had been phenomenal.

On Sunday 9 February classical music by the Corangamite Strings and a millinery display by Georgina Conheady accompanied a high tea that raised funds for the Terang branch of the Red Cross.

Frances Bryant was the driving force behind the fundraisers.

"I was thinking of doing a fundraiser for the local CFA. I spoke to Richard and he said 'OK'," Frances said.

The CFA fundraiser was booked and a raffle for BlazeAid started, involving the pub and Noorat businesses "I grew up here and know everyone. You do get some passing traffic, but our core business is the locals. They keep the doors open."

The pub has also become a popular stop for cyclists and people visiting the town for events such as the Terang and District Lions Club Fun Run & Walk, and the town garage sale each February, and the Noorat Show in November.

"We complement each other. It gives people something else to do in Noorat when they come here."

The final touch will be a series of paintings from eggs to hatched chicks, which will be animated as part of an augmented reality video visitors can view on their phones. It is expected to be complete by the end of April.

Warrnambool Artist Jimmi Buscombe spent 16 days in February on a telescopic boom lift painting a mural on the 15-metre-high water tower.

Mr Buscombe, who rose to fame when a video about his "Gutsy the Wombat" mural had 58 million views on Facebook, was selected after a competitive tendering process.

"I'm really excited about the project. I'm also a bit sad that it's finished which is always the way with these projects. It's always a bit bittersweet when you finish.

"I'm really, really rapt with how it's turned out.



"I'd had in mind to do one of these large-scale silo or water tower projects for years, but I'd never come across the opportunity before. When this came up, the opportunity to be part of something close to home and on that scale was really exciting."

The artwork was informed by the Lismore community who identified a number of themes they felt would reflect the town's identity and heritage, including native wildlife and sheep, which were the foundation for the town's economy.

North ward councillor Lesley Brown said the community was really excited about the project.

"This huge piece of public art will add to the character of the town and we hope it will encourage visitors to the explore the north of the Shire and the Volcanic Lakes and Plains tourism region."

The project was funded by the Shire and Berrybank windfarm developer Global Power Generation.

How long at Corangamite Shire? I've been here since October 2018.

How long at Corangamite Shire?

I have worked at Council for one year.

What is your background?

I studied graphic design in Ecuador. I did that job for years, then I worked at the first organic winery in California in the USA, working on the bottling line, labelling and packing bottles, cleaning tanks, pruning grapes, and in the harvest process.

How did you wind up at Naroghid? I moved to Camperdown in 2018 from Ecuador. I joined my partner, who was already living here, and we've made it our home. When I first arrived, it was very difficult to find work because I was new in Australia and had no Australian references. Then I started doing volunteering in a charity shop and planting trees with the Friends of the Forgotten Woodlands. I put in an expression of interest for Corangamite Shire and a job came up. From the first day I started everyone was very welcoming and friendly and supportive.

What does your role involve?

Do you have a pool or spa?

You need to register it by Monday 1 June. New State Government regulations mean you must register pools and spas with your local Council.

Safety barriers must be assessed by a registered private building surveyor or inspector who will issue certificates of compliance or non-compliance, which owners will need to lodge with Council.

New inspection compliance certificates will be required every four years. Owners wishing to do their own initial safety assessment can be guided by the following Victorian Building Authority checklists at www.vba.vic.gov.au

Work on an existing safety barrier, other than basic maintenance, is likely to require a building permit and will need to comply with regulations.

Time to get your flu shot

Did you know the end of April and early May is the best time to get your flu shot?

Be proactive before the flu season starts and visit your local pharmacy or GP for your immunisation.

In Victoria, you are eligible for a free flu shot if you are:

- A child aged six months to less than five years
- Pregnant
- Aged 65 years and over
- An Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander aged 15 years +
- Have a medical condition predisposing you to severe influenza

All your business permits in one step

Setting up a new business or expanding an existing one in Corangamite Shire has just got a whole lot easier.

Manager Growth and Engagement Rory Neeson said the Council has set up a new business liaison service to help guide applicants through each step of the process.

Called Better Approvals, the new, simplified process involves a personal relationship with a single "go-to" person, so applicants don't have to start again with each different department.

"Sometimes, complex regulations can be confusing for applicants. Having one familiar face to deal with, and a single online application form covering multiple permits, can help make the process faster and easier," Mr Neeson said.

"Often delays are caused when an applicant submits an application that is missing information, or with not enough detail.

"By working with the applicant from the start, we can identify any issues with permits early on, so applicants don't lose time—and money—before they can get on with their business.

"Now they can apply for all business permits at one time, on one form, on their smartphone.

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"The processes will all happen at the same time, rather than one after the other."

The Better Approvals Project is part of a statewide initiative to reduce the regulatory burden on small business and improve permit approvals times.

"The aim is to reduce the time and money small businesses spend while they're first setting up or expanding," Mr Neeson said.

"Better approvals will allow us to provide better customer service and strengthen our local economy by being an 'investment friendly' Shire."

Whose road is it? Local roads versus arterial roads

The State Government owns and manages 425 kilometres of arterial roads in Corangamite Shire.

Of that, 76.5 kilometres-about 18 percent-is rated "poor or distressed".

In fact, most of the calls we receive about road issues relate to these arterial roads.

The arterial (Regional Roads Victoria) network in Corangamite has deteriorated so much over the past 10 years that we need \$55 million just to bring it back to an acceptable (and safe) standard.

If you would like to report a roads maintenance issue, just follow these simple steps.

Use the map on the right to work out if the road is a local road, managed by Council, or an arterial road, managed by Regional Roads Victoria.

If it is an arterial road:

- 1. Go to the Regional Roads Victoria website on your your smart device or computer.
- 2. Hit the feedback button at the bottom right of page.
- 3. Register your concerns or call 133 RRV (133 778) Monday to Friday 8 am to 6 pm
