Welcome to the autumn edition of **Corangamite News**

It's strange to think that this time last year, we were about to head into our first COVID-19 lockdown.

This past year has been a real challenge for some of our residents. The impacts of COVID have been far-reaching and varied, and we've all had to adapt to living differently in some way. Some businesses have just survived, while others have thrived.

I want to thank all our residents who really shifted their focus to buying and supporting local businesses. Our communities continue to be resilient because we support each other, and that's what makes Corangamite a great place to live.

Council's current focus is the Community Vision 2040 and Council Plan 2021-2025. Under the new Victorian Local Government Act 2020, every Council must come up with a community-led vision of a preferred future for the whole municipality. This vision is created independently by the community, for the community. It is updated every four years with a newly elected Council.

Since December, residents have

been submitting ideas about how Council should prepare for the future. What's important to our communities? What are the long-term priorities? More than 100 submissions have been received so far (see more on page 5), and the 35-member Citizens Jury will meet in March and May to discuss themes and come up with a recommended vision and direction.

As a Council, we must genuinely serve and be ultimately guided by our communities. We recognise, too, that our 12 communities have totally different needs and wants. Skipton's priorities are going to be very different to Port Campbell's.

It is important these needs are captured in any Vision to ensure our Council represents all of our communities fairly and responsibly. Most of all, it's important this is driven by the community. I want to thank residents who have sent in submissions or put their hands up to be involved on the Citizens Jury.

Top citizens recognised

Skipton's John Kavanagh (top right) is Corangamite Shire's 2021 Citizen of the Year.

Mr Kavanagh's life of service to the community started 64 years ago when he joined the CFA as a 14 year old.

"The CFA is a good thing to get involved in," he said.

"It's very important. The knowledge you get is important for bad days, it'll save you and other people.

"I held just about every position in the CFA: fire manager, deputy group officer, strike team, leader sector commander. My first job was radio and I've been doing radio ever since on and off."

The former Mannibadar farmer moved to Skipton "10 or 15 years ago," and became a timber cutter, carting loads as far as Camperdown, Colac and Alvie.

In Skipton he kept up his lifelong association with the CFA and became involved in numerous other groups as well, including helping set up the Skipton Branch of the Friends of the RSL.

"It was one of the first friends of the RSL in Victoria. We hold two functions a year. Anzac Day and one in November. It gives

an opportunity for people to remember those who passed on years ago."

Mr Kavanagh joked that "you get no complaints," in his role as president of the Skipton Cemetery Trust.

"Then I was involved in the hall committee. It's a fairly well maintained hall. I'm in the photography club which is fairly successful. We have an annual photographic show which gets 700-800 entries each year."

Mr Kavanagh said his motivation to serve the community came down to "Things need to be done".

"You feel like you can contribute in a way. You get ideas and put them forward. They don't always come to fruition but people eventually come around.

"If you feel things should be done, get involved. Do it yourself. Surround yourself with like-minded people. There's no sense sitting at home complaining. You've got to get involved."

His wife of 52 years, Cath, has been by his side every step of the way.

"She's worked with me every day of our married life. If anything needs doing, she's out there with me."

The Birdcage Cafe: Lismore

It's been an eventful couple of years since Peter and Debra Shore opened The Birdcage Café in Lismore.

Major energy projects have allowed them to gain from the infrastructure workers what they lost in tourist trade during the pandemic.

"We're missing them at the moment – the overseas travellers and Melbournites," Peter said. The business has diversified to into curios, clothing, collectibles, and even locally grown flowers.

There are still plenty of coffees to sell to highway traffic passing between Ballarat and Warrnambool, or Melbourne and Hamilton.

"There's quite a bit of work with the wind farms and the power plant. They've been so good to us," Peter said.

Last year the Shores launched an outdoor dining area, with support from the State Government's COVID-19 Outdoor Eating and Entertainment Package.

"It's quite secure," Debra said. "You can sit there with kids. The highway is quite busy. You don't want them running out."

"We've been able to expand the menu. It's more efficient and easier to keep clean.

"We bought new equipment to cater for demand—a commercial sandwich press, new shake maker and deep fryer.

"We put in a new floor. It takes the wear and tear and is easier to clean."

There's new stainless walls and more stainless steel benches for improved cleaning and hygiene.

"We're a home-style café," Peter said.

"All the cakes and biscuits are made by our daughter Danielle Brain.

"We buy in gluten free because it's safer that way. We try to cater for everyone. Vegetarians and vegans we can accommodate."

The Shores, who moved from Melbourne 12 years ago in

November, opened the Birdcage on 28 February 2019. The name comes from Debra's favourite film and the décor references 'To Kill a Mockingbird', Alfred Hitchcock's 'The Birds', and glamorous women of the silver screen.

"We employ three local people part-time. The idea is hopefully we can build this up and can employ them long-term.

"The menu will improve and expand with more variety. One of my dreams would be to have it licensed and open with options for a wine and tapas or a full meal.

"This is it for Peter and I. This is our future. We love it. We're very passionate about it."

The Birdcage Cafe opens six days a week from 7 am, closing on Wednesdays for much earned rest and preparation for the work week ahead.

New Skipton skate park

Skipton's young and young-at-heart have more opportunities to stay active and healthy now the skate park at Jubilee Park is finished.

The multi-discipline street and transition style facility has a mini-ramp, a 1.2m-high quarter pipe, bank, ledge, flat rail, down ledge, and quarter to kerb.

The design caters for all skill levels, with obstacles mainly for beginner to intermediate skaters, BMX and scooter riders.

About the same length as the Skipton pool, it ties into the existing infrastructure including the playground, tennis courts, barbecue shelter, seating and walking paths.

Skipton Lions member Doug Smith is on the Skatepark 4 Skipton committee.

He said the Lions were approached about the possibility of a skate park and set up the committee with members from outside the club.

"They're in the 35-45 age range. These are people who have got kids from 10-20. They also have

the computer skills to get funding applications in."

The committee circulated a petition to gauge the level of community interest and almost 300 people signed.

"We put the petition into the supermarket and roadhouse and wherever. The kids all signed it and the parents were all very much in agreement."

As a result of the petition, Council allocated \$20,000 in its 2020-2021 Budget for design, and sourced \$120,000 through the Federal Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program. The community raised another \$50,000.

"[Stockyard Hill Wind Farm developer] Goldwind and our local Skipton Community Shop were very good contributors. Those two put in quite a bit of money and that really got the ball rolling. All the local businesses have contributed accordingly."

Mr Smith said many of the town's skaters had been using the highway and the new park would give them a safer place to skate.

"Some of the people with licenses will do the circuit of Scarsdale, Snake Valley and now Skipton. A few of them are talking about that circuit. That'll get the young ones from Ballarat."

Mr Smith said the skate park could also provide a rest break for families passing on the highway.

"It's a spectacular little site overlooking the lake here. We do hope it will stop a lot of the passing travellers with kids on board."

North Ward Councillor Nick Cole congratulated the committee and the community on their great work to get the project up and running.

"The committee members deserve a pat on the back for their months of hard work, as do the businesses and individuals who have contributed.

Member for Wannan, Dan Tehan said he was delighted that the skate park in Skipton had been included as a project under the Commonwealth Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) Program.

Grant programs now open

Community groups, organisations and individuals can benefit from Council's annual grants program.

The **Community Grants Program** is available for community events, workshops and equipment purchases, planning activities and the development of new community, leisure, cultural or recreational programs.

The **Facility Grants Program** offers support to Committees of Management and clubs or organisations whose primary function in the Shire is to help with facility improvements or equipment.

The **Environment Support Grants Program** provides support for incorporated community groups, organisations and individuals to undertake environment and sustainability projects in the Shire, including installation of energy and water-saving items at community facilities.

The **Events and Festivals Grants Program** includes funding and in-kind support for bigger events that increase visitation and stimulate economic activity in the Shire.

Applications open early April and close at 5 pm on Monday 24 May.

Preparing for COVID-19 vaccinations

As the cooler months approach, so does the annual flu season.

An annual flu vaccination not only protects you, it helps protect the wider community.

This year, residents will be offered free COVID-19 vaccinations as part of Australia's response to the global pandemic.

While initial COVID-19 vaccinations will be offered to Corangamite's frontline workers and 'at risk' residents, planning is well underway to deliver vaccinations to our wider population over the coming months.

Once you are vaccinated against a virus like influenza, measles or COVID-19, you are far less likely to catch the virus. If you do, the illness will be less severe and recovery time will be quicker.

The Australian Department of Health reminds residents that higher vaccination rates makes outbreaks much less likely.

In terms of COVID-19, it also reduces the need for preventive measures, such as border closures and travel restrictions.

Whose road is it?

Local roads versus arterial roads

The State Government owns and manages 603 kilometres of arterial roads in Corangamite Shire (see map on the right).

Most of the calls we receive about road issues relate to these arterial roads. We know our residents don't care whether it is a local (Council-owned) road, or an arterial (Regional Roads Victoria) road - they just want decent roads to travel on.

If you would like to report a roads maintenance issue, follow these simple steps.


Use the map on the right to work out if the road is a local road, managed by Council, or an arterial road, managed by Regional Roads Victoria.

If it is an arterial road:

1. Go to the Regional Roads Victoria website on your smart device or computer.
2. Hit the feedback button at the bottom right of page.
3. Register your concerns or call 133 RRV (133 778) Monday to Friday 8 am to 6 pm
4. Our customer service team can also help with RRV requests.

If it is a local road:

Make a customer request online at www.corangamite.vic.gov.au/Contact or call 03 5593 7100 between 8:30 am and 5 pm, Monday to Friday.

Works on the \$600K project (\$300K funded by Federal Government Local Roads and Community Infrastructure) are underway with initial site surveys. Project includes:

- New concrete footpaths on both sides of Curdie Street
- New seating and street furniture
- Accessible car parks repositioned and extra spaces added in Curdie Street
- New plantings



Mockridge Park upgrade

Corangamite Shire will submit a \$3.5 million funding application to the State Government's Community Sports Infrastructure Stimulus Program to redevelop Mockridge Park.

The proposed redevelopment, which is dependent on State Government funding to go ahead, includes a new pavilion, function centre, synthetic pitch, velodrome, female-friendly changerooms, and lighting.

The project is expected to attract new members to Camperdown's cycling, hockey and soccer

clubs, as well as new events to Camperdown.

We asked for community feedback on the initial plans and received more than 20 submissions.

These submissions addressed issues such as additional shade and shelter, the positioning of the new clubrooms, potential school use during the day, and naming the facility.

Works to expand Cobden & District Kindergarten are on track to be completed by May.


Corangamite Shire received \$689,000 back in September 2020 from the State Government's Building Blocks program to build a second playroom at the kindergarten. It received another \$260,000 from the Federal

Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program in early February.

The extra space will cater for the introduction of the subsidised three-year-old kindergarten program.
