

The full story of recycling and waste.

Where does it go and what happens to it?




Have have ever wondered what happens to your waste?

General waste goes to the Corangamite Regional Landfill at Naroghid, which receives 30,000 tonnes of waste annually. The landfill has cells for acceptance of waste. Each landfill ‘cell’ is carefully prepared to comply with strict EPA guidelines to minimise environmental impacts. Managing general waste presents a significant financial challenge for Council.

Recyclables are transported to a Materials Recovery Facility located in either Geelong or Melbourne. Items are sorted into different ‘streams’ using a variety of mechanical and manual sorting techniques. The materials are then baled and used for manufacturing into new products. Contamination in recycling makes the sorting process more difficult and can even lead to a whole batch of recycling ending up in landfill! Common causes of ‘contamination’ include plastic bags and nappies.

Organic waste from your green bin is transported to Corangamite Regional Landfill where it is mulched, composted and used onsite for rehabilitation purposes. In-organic items such as plastic cannot break down, they remain as contaminates in the compost. It’s important to keep plastic out of green bins.



Did you know that Corangamite Shire households send more than 3,600 tonnes of waste to landfill every year?

That's enough waste to fill almost 4.5 olympic swimming pools!

While most Corangamite residents have embraced recycling, there is still lots that we can all do to cut down on the waste we send to landfill.

Here at Corangamite Shire Council we are committed to helping our community reduce waste to landfill, increase recycling rates and reduce litter across the Shire. To achieve this, Council offers a three-bin kerbside collection service in most towns and runs five transfer stations across the Shire, as well as the regional landfill facility at Naroghid.

This guide is intended to help you to make the most of your waste and recycling services and facilities.

It includes information on what to put in each of the kerbside bins, how to sort waste before going to the transfer station and how to dispose of other tricky waste and recycling products.

Reducing waste to landfill is important for the environment and for our community. Once in landfill, waste produces greenhouse gases and contaminated water which can have a harmful impact on our environment. While these impacts are managed to minimise harm to environment, the cost of this management is borne by the community through waste fees.

Let's all do our part for the environment and community and cut Corangamite's waste by:



- Reducing waste in the first instance by consuming less, being a smart shopper and being conscious of over-packaging on goods you buy.
- Reusing items where possible before they go into the bin. Repair an item before replacing it or “upcycle” it for another purpose. This can contribute to significant savings and help to conserve the environment.
- Recycling by putting items in the correct bin when you have no further use for them. For a list of products which can be recycled but are not accepted in the yellow kerbside bin see pages 14-15 of this guide.

Landfill and Transfer Stations

Council manages the Corangamite Regional Landfill at Naroghid and Transfer Stations operating at Derrinallum, Port Campbell, Simpson, Skipton and Timboon. When visiting any of these facilities, please ensure all loads are secure and covered. Save money by sorting waste into categories of general waste (landfill), recycling, green waste and scrap metal. Asbestos, liquid wastes, volatile, explosive or flammable substances and medical/infected or prescribed waste materials are not accepted at any of the sites. **The current disposal charges can be found on Council's website www.corangamite.vic.gov.au**

Kerbside Waste Collection Services

Corangamite Shire provides kerbside waste collection services to properties in Camperdown, Gnotuk, Cobden, Derrinallum, Lismore, Port Campbell, Simpson, Skipton, Terang, Noorat, Glenormiston and Timboon. These properties pay a separate garbage charge on their rates to receive this service. Council has a three-bin collection service. This service includes:

- 120 litre general waste bin (red lid) collected weekly
- 240 litre recycling bin (yellow lid) collected fortnightly
- 240 litre green organics bin (green lid) collected fortnightly between January to September and weekly during October to December.

What day is my bin collected?

Where do I put my bins for collection?

To help our waste collection contractor collect your bins, please make sure you put your bins out for collection as follows:

- Place bins on the kerbside in front of your property by 8 pm on the day prior to your designated collection day
- Where no kerbing exists, place your bins as close as practicable to the edge of the road shoulder.
- Avoid placing your bin on the road surface
- Place the bins with the wheels facing the property
- Make sure that there is at least 1 metre space between your bins and that the bins are free of obstructions such as power poles, letter boxes, trees and parked cars
- Don't overload your bins - lids should be closed to reduce spillage during collection
- Don't put any bags or containers next to the bin - these won't be collected
- Make sure your bin weighs less than 80 kgs

Where these requirements are not met, your bin may not be collected. In this instance a notice will be left on your bin informing you of the issue.

How to put your bin out for collection

My bin hasn't been collected. What do I do?

If there was an issue with your bin that prevented it from being collected (i.e. the bin was too heavy or contamination in the bin), there will be a notice left on your bin informing you of the reason for the non-collection. You will need to fix this issue before your bin is collected. If your bin hasn't been collected and there is no notice on your bin, please contact Council on 5593 7100. Council will organise the contractor to return to collect the bins. The contractor will not however return to collect bins if the bin was not on the kerb at the time of the collection.

My bin was stolen or vandalised. How do I get a replacement?

If your bin is stolen or vandalised, you need to complete a statutory declaration and forward it to Council to get a new one. Please make sure you put on the form which bin was stolen or vandalised. Once Council has received your completed statutory declaration, Council will order your new bin. Council will cover the cost of the replacement bin.

My bin is missing. How do I get a replacement?

If your bin is missing, please contact Council on 5593 7100 to organise a replacement bin. Council does not cover the cost of replacement bins where the bin is missing. All replacement bins must be purchased through Council and the resident will be invoiced for the new bin once it is delivered. If you have just moved into a new property and there are no bins, you may wish to speak to your real estate agent or landlord to locate the property's bins before ordering replacement bins from Council.

My bin is damaged. How do I get it repaired or replaced?

If your bin is damaged, please contact Council on 5593 7100 to organise repairs or a replacement bin. If the bin damage is your fault (i.e. burnt due to hot ashes), you will need to cover the cost of replacement or repair of the bin. If the bin is damaged by the contractor or from general wear and tear, Council or the contractor will cover the replacement or repair costs.

Can I get additional bins collected?

Council will only consider supplying additional kerbside collection bins to properties where there are special circumstances that meet guidelines set out in the Kerbside Waste Collection Policy, such as medical conditions that increase the volume of waste. Please contact Council to discuss any request for additional bins. A copy of the **Kerbside Waste Collection Policy can be found on Council's website www.corangamite.vic.gov.au**

What happens to unauthorised bins?

Any bins not supplied by Council (for the purpose of the service) will not be collected by Council's waste contractor. Where a premise is found to have unauthorised Council mobile bin(s), Council will take appropriate action to retrieve them. This includes premises that have additional non-approved Council bins.

What goes in each bin? For an A-Z list of what goes in each bin see pages 14-15.

Council may not collect your bin if there is contamination in your recycling or green organics bin. In this instance a notice will be left on your bin informing you of the issue to be rectified. Plastic bags are not permitted in the recycling bin. This includes recyclables bagged in plastic bags.

What's in your bin?

Audits of kerbside bins reveal that up to 65% of items in the waste bin could have been diverted from landfill. This includes organic waste, food scraps and food still in packaging. Approximately 28% consists of recyclable materials like paper and plastic containers.

Preventing food waste in the first instance is beneficial for the environment and your wallet. When food wastage cannot be avoided, keep organics out of landfill by disposing of them in your green bin or home compost system. If the food container is recyclable there is no need to wash it clean, just make sure it is empty and put it in the yellow bin.

The average Corangamite household waste bin contains:

WHAT GOES IN?

HOUSEHOLD RUBBISH which cannot be reused, recycled or composted. Can include 'scrunchable' soft plastic packaging, shopping bags, nappies, cigarette butts, CDs and DVDs. Broken glass, crockery and pyrex should be wrapped in paper.



Do not dispose of chemicals, oils, gas bottles, electrical appliances, batteries, asbestos, fluorescent light globes or building materials in kerbside bin. Refer to pages 14-15 for a list of waste products not accepted in the kerbside bins and information on where to safely dispose of them.

Recycle from every room!

Victorians are pretty good at recycling.

According to recent research, we produce around 15 per cent less rubbish today than we did ten years ago, and 60 per cent more recyclable materials are collected by kerbside recycling services.* Research shows that household rubbish bins still contain items that could have been recycled. By making a few changes and collecting recycling from all rooms at home, you can reduce waste to landfill. All rigid plastics are accepted in the recycling. Soft plastic items which can be easily scrunched e.g. bread bags, shopping bags, cannot be put in your recycle bin. For information on recycling “scrunchable” plastics refer to page 18.

Minimise food waste

Save money and reduce waste by improving your methods of food shopping, storage and use of left overs.

Minimise Environmental Impacts

Many householders tend not to think of food waste as having an adverse impact on the environment because it is biodegradable. Food waste accounts for up to 40% of the rubbish that ends up in landfill where it creates methane, a greenhouse gas that is 25 times worse than carbon dioxide. Diverting food waste from landfill provides cost savings to the community as food waste is costly to manage in landfills.

Some organic waste is unavoidable, such as fruit and veggie peelings, egg shells and tea bags. Help to reduce greenhouse gases by disposing of organic waste in your green bin or home compost, worm farm or chooks.



Make the most of your waste

- **Composting** – it's easier than you think. Turn garden clippings, food waste and paper into nutrient-rich compost for your garden. Grow your own food, save money and eat well!
- **Worm Farms** – the perfect low maintenance pets! Worms break down food scraps transforming it into fertiliser for your garden in the form of 'worm wee' and worm castings.
- **Chickens** – In exchange for food scraps chooks will supply you with garden fertiliser, pest control and eggs!

WHAT GOES IN?

GARDEN WASTE

weeds, leaves, lawn clippings, prunings, flowers, small branches, twigs

FOOD SCRAPS

vegetable peelings, dairy, leftovers, cooked food, teabags and coffee grounds, meat and bones, egg shells, prawn and oyster shells, citrus

OTHER ORGANICS

small non-treated timber, dog poo and kitty litter, vacuum cleaner dust, cold ashes, soiled paper and pizza boxes



'Compostable' bags made from plant products are accepted in the green bin. Be aware that 'biodegradable' bags are not accepted as they are still a petroleum-based plastic which degrades into smaller pieces.

TIPS

Line your bin with leaves or lawn clippings to prevent food scraps from sticking to the bottom.

Wrap kitchen scraps in newspaper to reduce odours and prevent them sticking to the bin.

DETOX YOUR HOME



Detox Your Home is a **safe, free and easy-to-use** service to dispose of common household chemicals without harming your health or the environment.

Household paint, batteries and light bulbs can be disposed of all year round at a permanent drop-off site.

Mobile collections:

Unwanted or out-of-date household chemicals can only be disposed of at free Detox your Home mobile collections, where trained chemists are on hand to properly handle and dispose of these items. Mobile collections are held annually in Colac, Ballarat and Warrnambool.

What to do with tricky items

Agricultural chemicals

ChemClear is a program set up to provide safe collection and disposal of obsolete and unwanted agricultural chemicals. To dispose of unwanted chemicals, you can book a collection through the ChemClear hotline

While some chemicals are free to dispose of, there may be a fee for disposal depending on the chemical type and its expiry date.

Agricultural chemical containers

drumMUSTER is the national program for the collection and recycling of agricultural chemical containers. Through this program, chemical containers can be dropped off free of charge at Corangamite Regional Landfill and any of our transfer stations (except Port Campbell). Council can only accept containers that carry the drumMUSTER logo, are clean, dry and free of chemical residue (dirt, rust and dye stains are acceptable), and have the lids removed. Metal drums must be pierced from top to bottom for draining and airing. **For more information about drumMUSTER visit www.drummuster.com.au**

Asbestos

Asbestos is not accepted at Corangamite Regional Landfill or transfer stations. Refer to the Yellow Pages for a licenced asbestos removalist.

Batteries

Batteries contain plastics, metals and toxic metals such as cadmium, lead and mercury. As batteries are hazardous, they should not be disposed of in the red kerbside bin or into landfill. Batteries can cause fires if deposited to landfill. You can drop off used batteries free of charge at Corangamite Regional Landfill for recycling. Leaky batteries cannot be accepted. Batteries are also accepted at the permanent

Detox Your Home facilities: Western Waste Transfer Station in Colac, the Ballarat Transfer Station and the Statewide Recycling Services facility in Warrnambool.

Broken glass

Broken glass must be wrapped and placed in your red bin or disposed of in landfill.

Car batteries

Car batteries and other lead-acid batteries are hazardous waste and should not be put into landfill. Car batteries can be recycled at Corangamite Regional Landfill or at one of the Council's transfer stations.

Used cooking oil

If solidified, oil can be wrapped in paper (not plastic) and put into your green organics bin or home compost bin. For liquid oil, it is best to allow it to soak into another compostable item, such as old bread, before adding to the green organics bin or compost bin. For commercial quantities of cooking oil, check **www.recyclingnearyou.com.au/** for locations

Clothing, Books and Furniture

Op-shops are happy to accept donations of pre-loved goods such as clothing, books and furniture. Proceeds from sales go to charity.

Dead animals

Dead animals are accepted at Corangamite Regional Landfill for composting. A prior appointment is necessary and fees apply.

Electrical items (e-waste)

Old, broken and unwanted electric items can be recycled free at Corangamite Regional Landfill and transfer stations. Almost any item that can be plugged into a powerpoint can be recycled.

Flares

Expired Flares can be handed in at the following Police Stations - Port Campbell, Warrnambool, Geelong and Apollo Bay.

Food scraps

Food scraps can be included in your green organics bin or compost bin. All food scraps are accepted in the green organics bin including meat, dairy, citrus and cooked foods. Empty food from its container first and check if the packaging can be recycled. Food scraps can also be included in green-waste deposited at transfer stations (fees apply).

Gas bottles

Pressurised gas cylinders cannot be disposed of in landfill as they present a danger when compacted. Household gas bottles are accepted at Corangamite Landfill and transfer stations.

Light globes

Incandescent globes should be wrapped in newspaper and put in the red kerbside bin or taken to landfill. Fluorescent and compact fluorescent globes contain mercury so should be recycled rather than put into landfill. You can drop light globes off for recycling at the Detox Your Home facilities located at Ballarat Transfer Station, the Western Waste Transfer Station in Colac or Statewide Recycling Services in Warrnambool.

Mattresses

Mattresses cannot be disposed of in landfill. Mattresses are accepted at Corangamite Regional Landfill and transfer stations for recycling (fees apply). Alternatively, the mattress can be dismantled prior to transporting to the landfill or transfer station, where steel springs can be disposed of free of charge.

Medicines

Unwanted or expired medicines can be dropped off at most pharmacies for safe disposal.

Mobile phones

Mobile phones and mobile phone batteries cannot be recycled in the yellow kerbside bins. MobileMuster has a free recycling service for old mobile phones. Visit the MobileMuster website for details: mobilemuster.com.au

Paint tins

Household paint can be disposed of all year round at the Detox Your Home facilities located at Ballarat Transfer Station, Western Waste Transfer Station in Colac or Statewide Recycling Services in Warrnambool.

Plastic bags

Plastic shopping bags cannot be put in the recycling bin. Plastic bags can be disposed of in landfill or in the red kerbside rubbish bins, although it is preferable that you recycle them. Check if your local supermarket or op-shop accepts plastic bags for recycling. Reusable bags are a more environmentally friendly alternative to plastic shopping bags. Remember to take your reusable bags when you go shopping to reduce plastic bag waste.

Plastic (scrunchable)

Scrunchable plastic bags including bread bags, biscuit packets, frozen food bags, rice and pasta bags, confectionary packets, and plastic shopping bags can be recycled into new plastic products such as outdoor furniture and signage. Printer Cartridges

Used printer cartridges can be dropped off at participating Australia Post stores. Check the Recycling Near You website for locations. <http://recyclingnearyou.com.au/>

Silage wrap

To recycle your silage wrap, follow these steps:

- Purchase your TAPEX liner bags.
Visit www.plasback.com.au for details
- Shake the wrap to get rid of excess moisture, silage and other debris
- Roll the wraps into tight balls to fit in the TAPEX liner bags
- Drop your silage wrap in the TAPEX liner bags off at one of our PlasbackTM drop-off points: Corangamite Regional Landfill, transfer stations at Simpson and Timboon (fees apply).

Silage wrap will NOT be accepted if:

- It is not presented in a TAPEX liner bag
- It is contaminated. Contamination includes bale net, twine, steel and general rubbish. Contaminated silage wrap will be placed in landfill and will incur additional costs.

Plastic is recycled and made into a timber replacement plywood sheeting alternative called Tuffboard. To ensure the long term sustainability of the silage wrap recycling program in the south west region, there is a small fee to drop off bags at transfer stations to cover transportation costs associated with recycling. Steel and Whitegoods

Council accepts scrap steel, whitegoods and air conditioners at all transfer stations through the scrap metal collection. Council can only accept refrigerated items that have been degassed by a licenced degasser.

Tyres

Used tyres can be disposed of for recycling at Corangamite Regional Landfill for a fee.

Used motor oil

Non-commercial quantities of used motor oil are accepted free of charge at all Corangamite waste facilities except the Skipton Transfer Station.

Recycling away from home

Public Place Recycling

Council has installed public place recycling bins at the Port Campbell Foreshore, Timboon and Cobden townships and Finlay Avenue and Apex Park in Camperdown. The aim of these bins is to encourage residents and visitors to recycle in public places as well as at home. Make sure you do the right thing and recycle in the correct bin.



Waste Wise Events Trailer

Corangamite Shire provides the Waste Wise Events Trailer for community events held within the Shire. The trailer consists of 12 waste bins, 12 recycling bins and bin caps which may be borrowed free of charge by event organisers to provide waste and recycling bins at community events.
