Free child care Information for families from Services Australia

Dear families,

In response to COVID-19, child care is free. This means Centrelink is not currently paying Child Care Subsidy (CCS).

If you were getting CCS before 6 April 2020, you won't need to do anything for it to start again when the free child care period ends.

If you recently started using child care, you should find out about CCS.

What is CCS?

CCS helps with the cost of approved child care. Centrelink pays this subsidy directly to your child care provider to reduce the fees you pay.

Who can get it?

To get CCS you need to meet certain requirements.
Centrlink will also consider your cirumstances to work out how much you can get.

How do I apply?

If you want to get CCS when it starts again, and haven't already applied, you should <u>submit your</u> claim now.

TALKING ABOUT WELLBEING




Our team embraced the opportunity to join a School Readiness Funding (SRF) coaching session with well-respected early childhood professionals Catharine Hydon and Gilda Howard.

'Wellbeing' is this year's focus for SRF projects, and the approach of each kindergarten program reflects their children, families, communities and staff. It was the first time the group has come together using Teams.

Catharine and Gilda have been working with each kindergarten individually and recently facilitated the second group workshop. Themes discussed were building relationships, learning about emotions, problem solving, managing conflict, feeling good about what you can do and cooperation. Educators talked about the importance of keeping connections with children and families, and children's resilience, responsiveness, self-regulation and capacity building.

These qualities are not just relatable to the children but have been very evident within the team as educators work as front-line staff continuing to provide flexible and innovative learning opportunities. While COVID-19 has given us many challenges, educators shared several positives for children's wellbeing; there has been more individualised one to one time, children have been adaptable to change, and resilience and independence skills have been strengthened. As we come out of the restrictions, we have an opportunity to reflect on practice that will continue to improve 'wellbeing' outcomes for children, families, communities and staff.

This has allowed for extended time to investigate and solve problems, and for educators to support learning threads. In the sandpit there has been much extension and cooperative play with setting up of work sites, quarries, dams and pipe work! This has translated into some amazing paintings and box construction, as well as research through books and videos.
